

## WARD 5 – PETERHEAD NORTH AND RATTRAY STATISTICAL SUMMARY

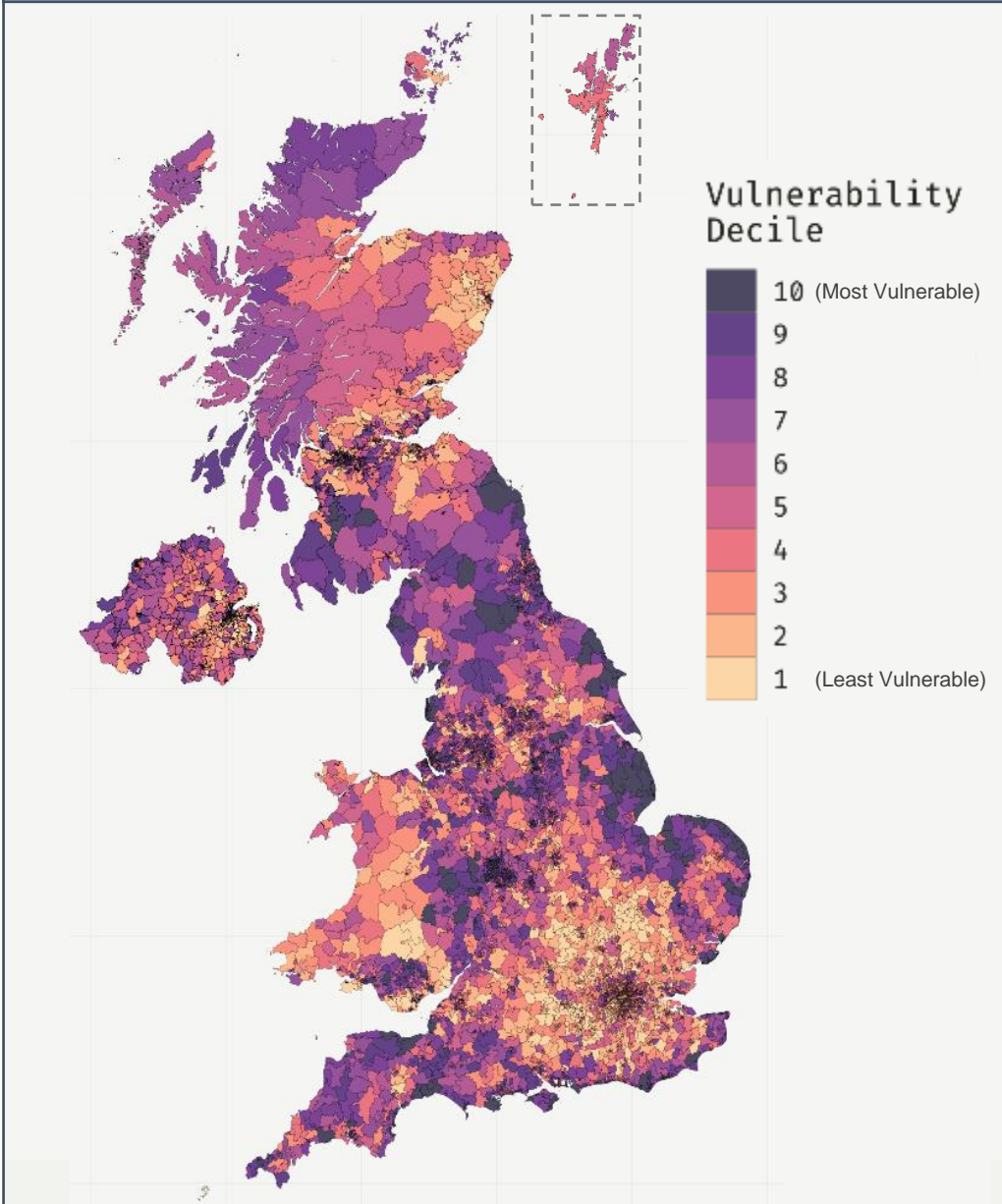

<p><b>Overall COVID Vulnerability Spectrum</b> (Based on 2 major studies)</p> <p style="text-align: right; margin-right: 100px;">78.9</p> <p>Less Vulnerable <span style="display: inline-block; width: 100%; height: 15px; background: linear-gradient(to right, green, yellow, orange, red);"></span> More Vulnerable</p>	<p>Ward 5 – Peterhead North and Rattray – remains one of the most vulnerable Wards in Aberdeenshire when all relevant indicators are taken into account. This evidenced by the ‘slider’ graphs on the left, which place the Ward on a spectrum, from least vulnerable to most vulnerable. The Ward’s score per Theme is situated above the black markers in each graph. The closer the black marker is to the green side of the graph the less vulnerable that Ward is relative to all other Wards in Aberdeenshire.</p> <p><b>Overall COVID Vulnerability Spectrum</b> – The Ward scored 78.9 (unchanged since the previous CIA report). This is the 5<sup>th</sup> highest (i.e. 5<sup>th</sup> worst) in Aberdeenshire. Peterhead Harbour may be considered the most vulnerable IZ in this Ward. Indeed, it is among the most vulnerable in Aberdeenshire. This is due to a number of themes that comprise the indices, from health-related indicators, to pupil support needs, as well as the make-up of the local jobs market Some sectors are vulnerable in the context of Covid.</p> <p><b>Overall Age Vulnerability Spectrum</b> – The Ward scored 63.2 (a slight improvement since the previous CIA report). This is the 8<sup>th</sup> highest (i.e. 8<sup>th</sup> worst) in Aberdeenshire. Peterhead Ugieside may be considered the most vulnerable IZ in this Ward. The area is home to a higher-than-average proportion of people aged 65+ with underlying health conditions (i.e. those in receipt of Attendance Allowance (AA) benefits), and a higher-than-average population aged 65+. All other IZs in the area comprise a lower-than-average proportion of people aged 65+ relative to their respective populations.</p> <p><b>Overall Health Vulnerability Spectrum</b> – The Ward scored 100 (a slight deterioration since the previous CIA report). This makes the area the most vulnerable in Aberdeenshire from a health perspective. The number of Covid-related deaths in the area to some extent bears this out. The 4 IZs associated with the Ward accounted for 43 of the 253 deaths in Aberdeenshire between March 2020 and June 2021 (17% of total Covid-related deaths over that period). A total of 8 deaths were recorded since the previous iteration of this report.</p> <p><b>Overall Economic Vulnerability Spectrum</b> – The Ward scored 94.7 (unchanged since the previous CIA report). This is the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest (i.e. 2<sup>nd</sup> worst) in Aberdeenshire. In the context of this Ward, Peterhead Harbour is the most vulnerable in an economic sense given the area’s relative unemployment rate, Universal Credit rate, child poverty rate and SIMD income deprivation rate.</p> <p><b>Overall Other Socio-Economic Spectrum</b> – The Ward scored 94.7 (a slight deterioration since the previous CIA report). This is the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest (i.e. 2<sup>nd</sup> worst) in Aberdeenshire. The area tends to rank poorly in respect of the ‘housing’ indicators – a relatively high proportion of households are overcrowded, and a comparatively high proportion of the population receive housing benefits. Food vulnerability may also be an issue.</p>

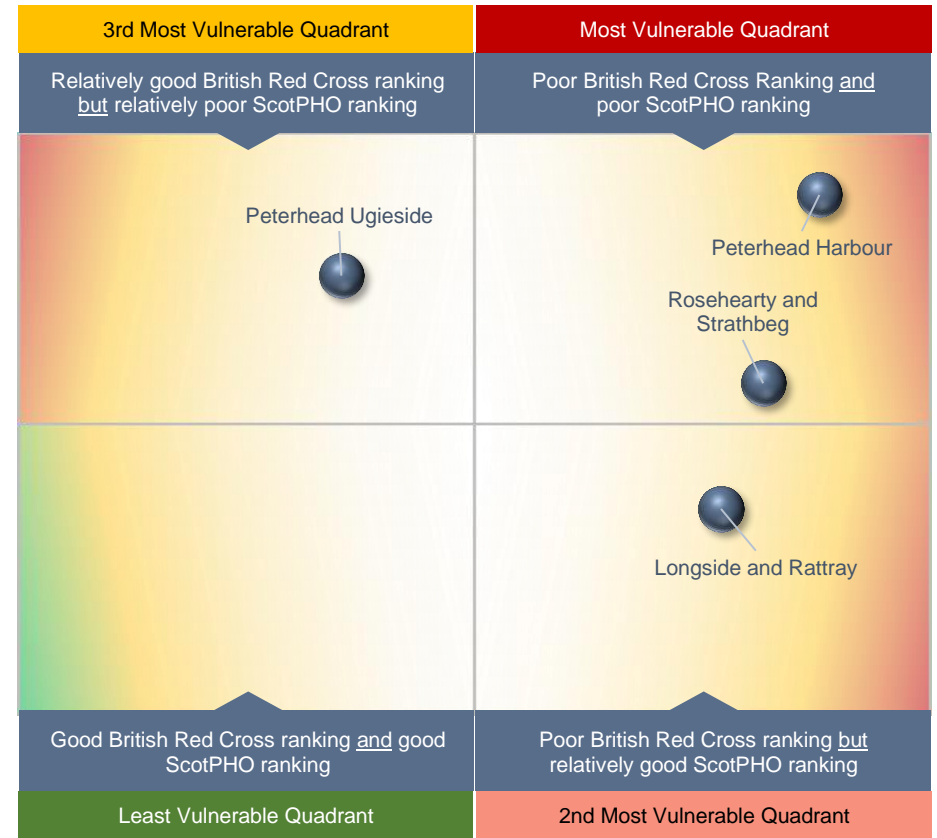

**Summary**

The chart above aims to place the MMW's Intermediate Zones on a scale based on two major Covid-specific studies conducted last year – one from the Scottish Public Health Observatory (ScotPHO), the other from the British Red Cross. These were based on dozens of indicators encompassing health and other socio-economic datasets.

The black circles in the chart represent each Intermediate Zone (IZ) associated with the Ward. The closer the black circle is to the top-right of the chart, the more vulnerable it is in the context of Aberdeenshire ('Most Vulnerable Quadrant').

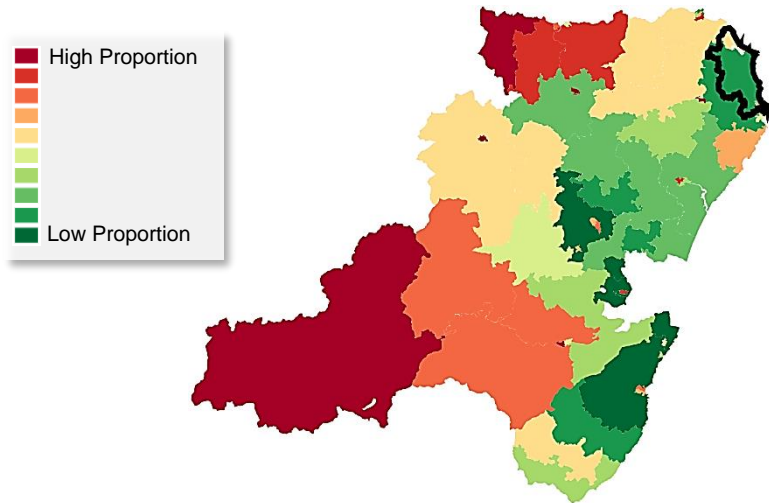
Taken together, this Ward is among the most vulnerable in Aberdeenshire. Peterhead Harbour is the most vulnerable in the Ward based on the two major studies conducted last year. These rankings have not changed since the previous CIA report.

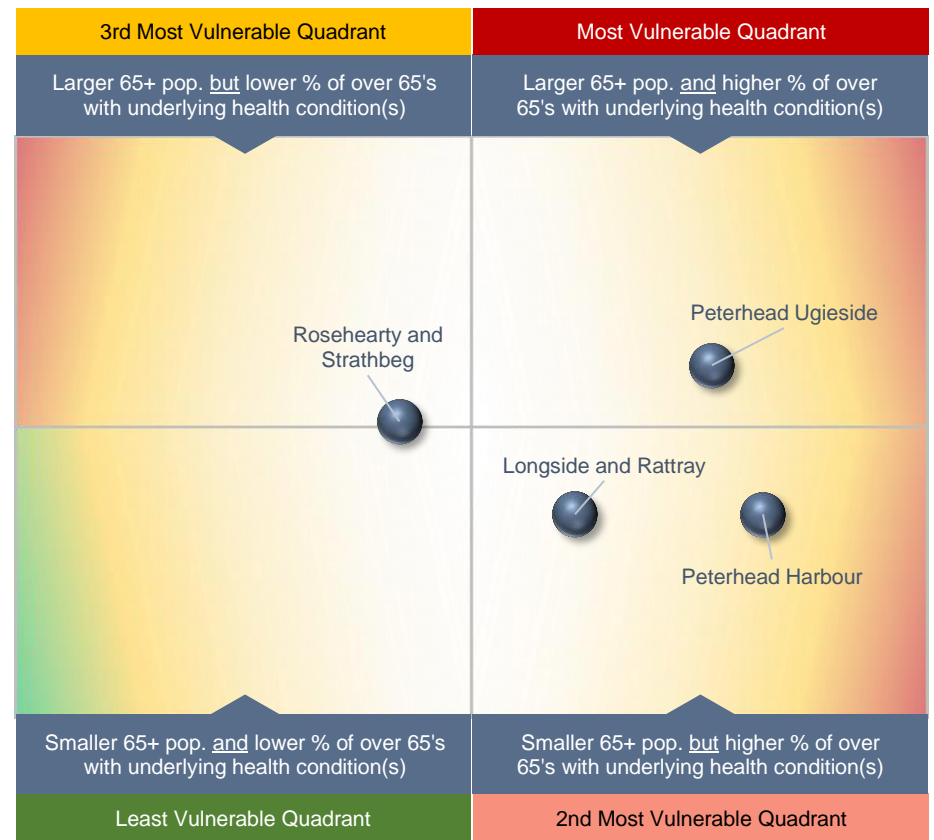

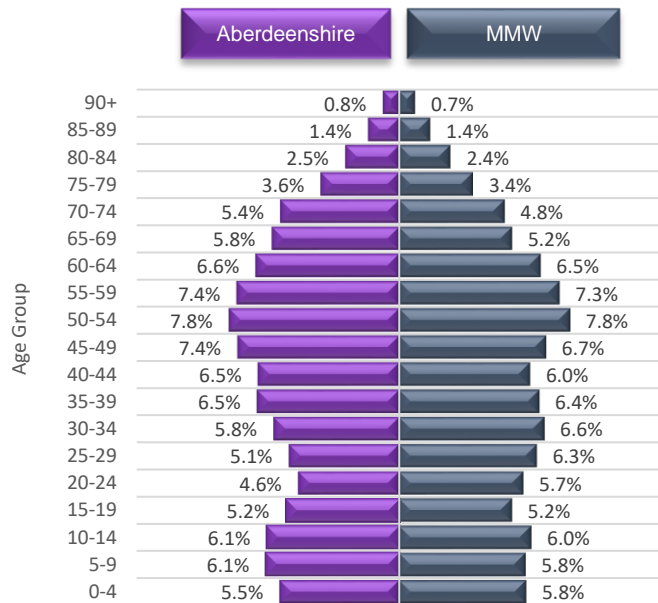
**Map of Multi-Member Ward Intermediate Zones – 65+ population (2019)**

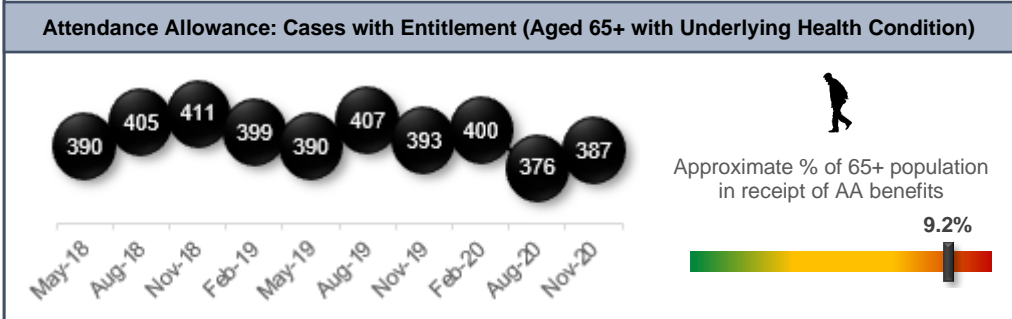
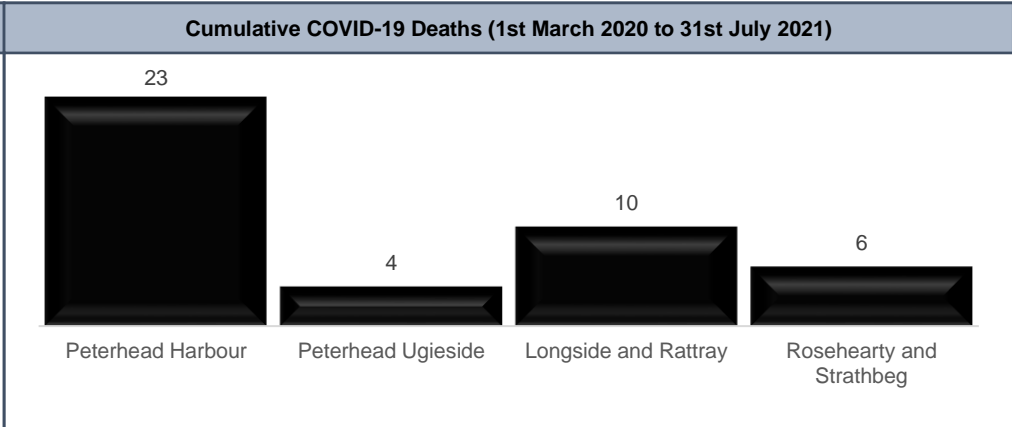
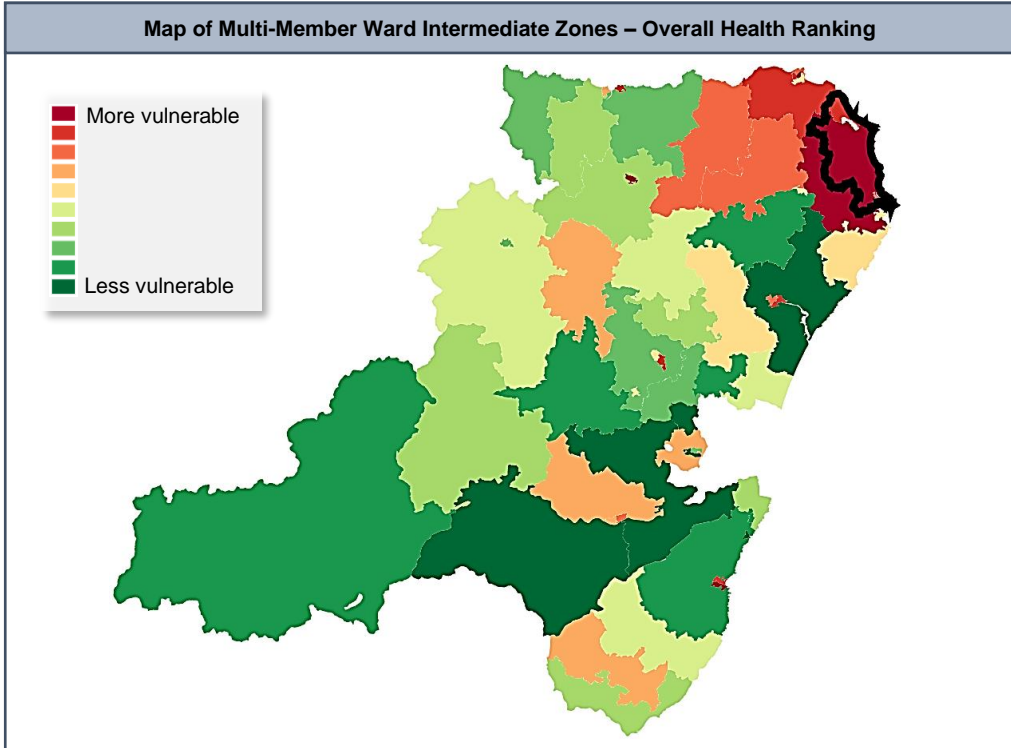
**Summary**

The Ward remains towards the vulnerable end of the spectrum in terms of certain age-specific vulnerability indicators. Peterhead Ugieside is located inside the top-right quadrant in the chart above (the 'Most Vulnerable Quadrant'). This is because the general region is home to a higher-than-average proportion of people aged 65+ with underlying health conditions (i.e. those in receipt of Attendance Allowance (AA) benefits); and a higher-than-average population aged 65+. Peterhead Harbour is also home to a relatively high AA rate.

Within the Ward, AA rates range from 6.6% in Rosehearty and Strathbeg to 11.0% in Peterhead Harbour (Longside's rate is 8.7%, Peterhead Ugieside's is 10.4%). Across the Council area rates range from 2.3% to 12.3%, so these IZs are towards the higher end of the spectrum. Rates have remained stable since the previous iteration but have reduced overall, possibly a result of a higher proportion of people aged 65+ relative to the previous year.

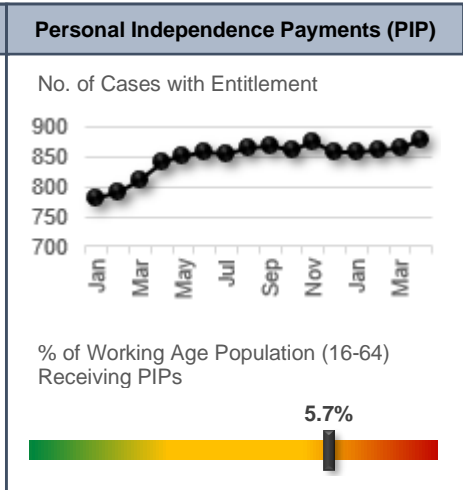
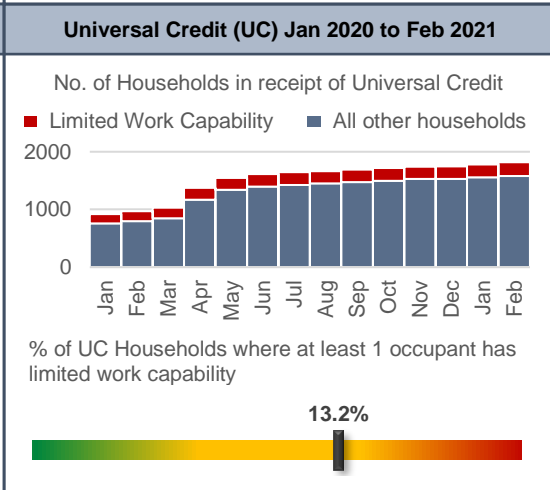


### Summary

Most health-related indicators suggest the general population within the Ward is somewhat less healthy than the general population of Aberdeenshire. IZs associated with this Ward recorded 43 COVID-related deaths between March 1<sup>st</sup> and June 30<sup>th</sup> 2021, an increase of 8 deaths since the previous report (3 more in both Longside & Rattray and Roseharty, and 1 more in the other 2 IZs. Peterhead Harbour remains the number 1 ranked IZ in terms of the number of deaths, but the vast majority occurred in the early days of the pandemic. (Aberdeenshire recorded a total of 253 COVID-related deaths between March 1<sup>st</sup> and June 30<sup>th</sup> 2021, an increase of 136 since the previous report.)

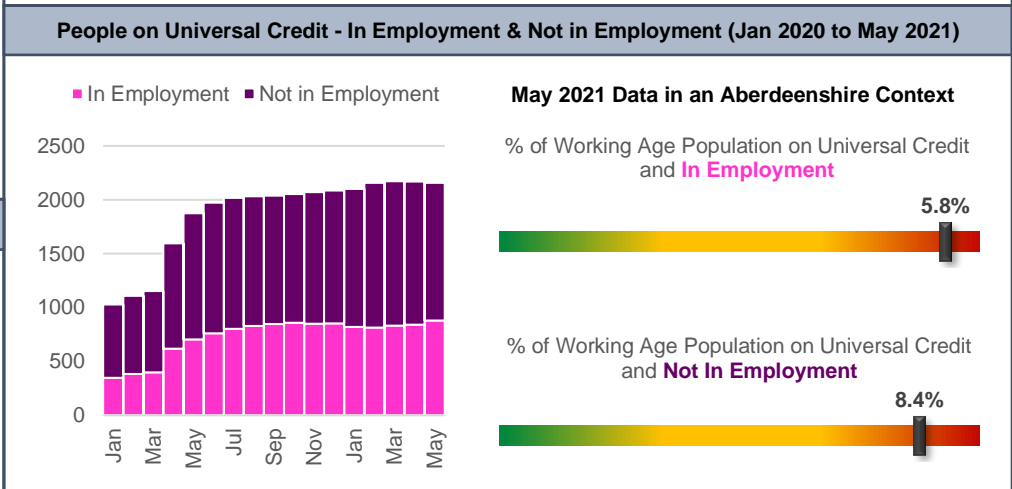
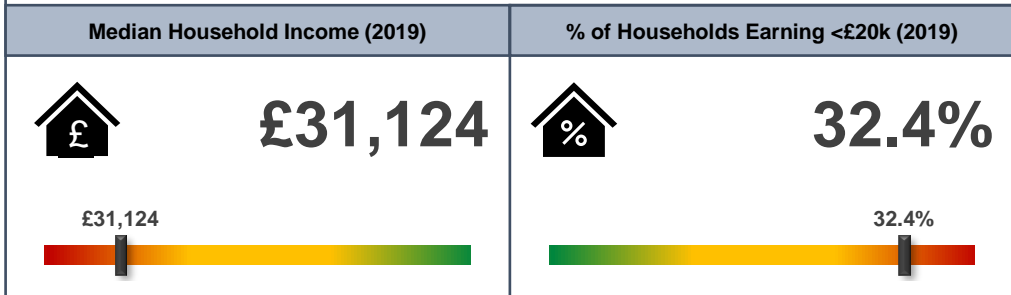
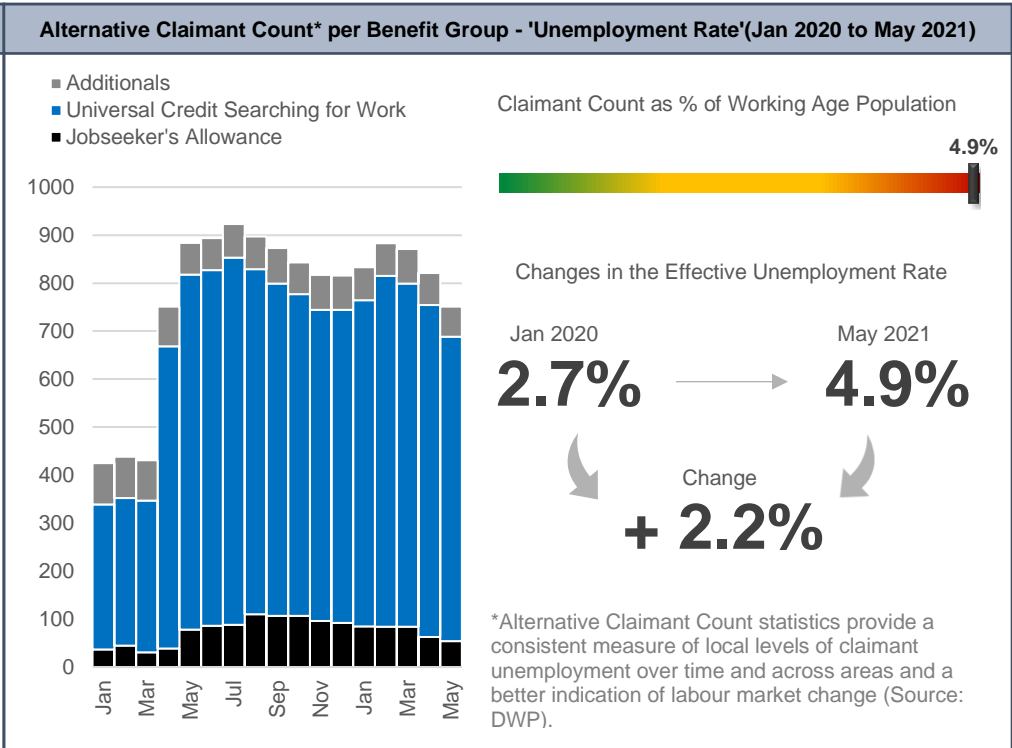
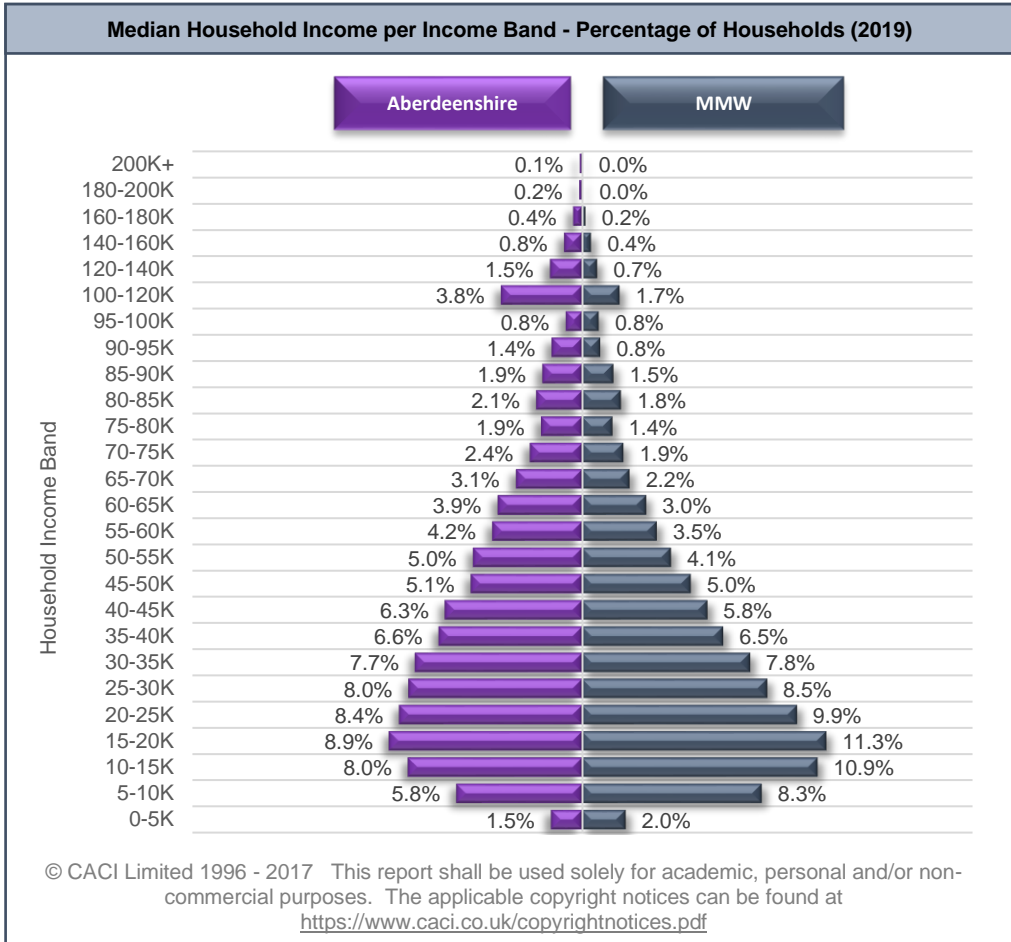
Covid deaths notwithstanding, Peterhead Harbour generally has the worst overall health profile in Aberdeenshire based on a number of pre-Covid health-related indicators. The area generally ranks poorly across the board, with only 2 of the 25 health-related indicators not among the worst rankings in the Shire.

Benefits related to disability (PIP payments) are on the rise throughout the Ward, and hundreds of additional households receive Universal Credit compared to at the beginning of the pandemic.









Economic Indicators (1 of 2)

Summary																													
<p>This Ward is generally worse off than other areas in Aberdeenshire in terms of the various indicators seen on this, and the previous, page. The proportion of households earning less than £20,000, for instance, is among the highest in Aberdeenshire, and median household income is towards the lower end of the spectrum. The proportion of pensioners in receipt of Pension Credits is among the highest in the Aberdeenshire, suggesting pensioner poverty may be an issue here – so, too, may income deprivation, with most areas recording a higher-than-average proportion. Peterhead Harbour's rate is among the highest in the authority area.</p> <p>Unemployment figures appear to have plateaued after a steep rise from Jan to Jul 2020. Indeed, latest figures show a slight decrease. However, the number of people on Universal Credit hasn't followed suit, which suggests a degree of financial hardship exists for a portion of the population, particularly residents in and around Peterhead Harbour.</p> <p>The next page suggest the Ward is among the most vulnerable in respect of the indicators used. The area tends to rank poorly in respect of the 'housing' indicators – a relatively high proportion of households are overcrowded, and a comparatively high proportion of the population receive housing benefits. Food vulnerability may also be an issue.</p>
