1 Introduction

From mountain to sea, Aberdeenshire boasts a rich and valuable resource in its natural environment. The varied landscape, habitats and native species of North East Scotland are a tremendous resource for both local inhabitants and visitors alike. The area is rich in biodiversity and holds sites of national and international importance.

The North East Scotland Biological Records Centre (NESBReC) has the job of managing biodiversity data and promoting the natural environment within Aberdeenshire and other local authorities. This involves partnership working with a diverse range of bodies including national agencies, community groups and most importantly a significant number of individuals who regularly contribute species records to NESBReC. The core of the team's work is based around the management of a database of biodiversity information and providing such data to decision makers and other data requestors.

1.1 Scope of Strategy

The NESBReC Strategy provides a structured approach to service delivery for the three-year period 2020-23. The Strategy is primarily an Aberdeenshire Council working document to help manage and deliver the key priorities, aims and objectives of NESBReC. The Strategy also provides opportunities to improve efficiency, participation and collaboration with key stakeholders and partners and embed best practice in the delivery of NESBReC's key priorities, aims and objectives.

This Strategy shows where NESBReC delivers or contributes to Scottish Government and Aberdeenshire Council priorities and recognises the financial support of Scottish Natural Heritage (now known as NatureScot), Aberdeen City Council, the Cairngorms National Park Authority and Scottish Forestry.

Through the period of the Strategy there will be a requirement to consider the challenges of our changing environment and the changing needs of our present and potential user groups. These challenges will include not only the effects of climate change, but also the necessary reactions to the arrival of Covid-19. To reflect these changes and challenges, an Annual Action Plan will be prepared for each year of the Strategy period which will provide detailed actions on the delivery of the Strategy and reflect the new priorities both at a Council level and beyond, as stated within the Council Plan approved in October 2020.

1.2 Aberdeenshire Council's Vision for NESBReC

It is Aberdeenshire Council's vision to be the best area and the best Council in Scotland.

It is NESBReC's aim that the benefits gained from Aberdeenshire's unique natural environment should be available to those who live, work and visit Aberdeenshire, and that the value of these resources, and the need to protect and enhance them for future generations through sustainable management, is understood. This vision for NESBReC can be summarised thus:

"We will collate, manage and disseminate biological data for the benefit of all in order to protect, promote and enhance the biodiversity of North East Scotland"

2 Resources

NESBReC is part of Aberdeenshire Council's Specialist Services Team within the Planning & Environment Service, Infrastructure Services. NESBReC comprises 2.6 (full-time equivalent) staff made up of 1.0 NESBReC Co-ordinator, 1.0 GIS Project Officer and 0.6 Data Assistant posts.

The staff are based in Woodhill House and cover not only the entirety of Aberdeenshire but also Aberdeen City, Moray and the Cairngorms National Park.

The financial budget for 2020-21 predicts total income of £83,393. NESBReC receives an annual contribution of £16,000 from Aberdeenshire Council and £7,120 from Aberdeen City Council under a Service Level Agreement. A grant of £40,473 will be received from NatureScot in 2020-21. However, NatureScot funding is now on an annual cycle and long-term funding from this source cannot be predicted with any certainty. The remaining income is generated by small grants from supporting organisations, project work (including work for Aberdeenshire Council) and ongoing consultancy income. The allocated staffing budget for 2020-21 is £93,883 and £25,000 for travel, administration, supplies and services costs. Any annual shortfall in income to meet expenditure for NESBReC, is met by the Planning & Environment Service budget.

Looking ahead, future budgets for NESBReC will need to take into consideration the effects of local authority expenditure in dealing with Covid-19. This Strategy has been produced with this in mind, although it is assumed in terms of the staffing budget for NESBReC there are no significant changes planned.

4 NESBReC Strategy Priorities, Aims, and Objectives

The NESBReC Annual Action Plan provides the detailed actions the Team will take to achieve the Strategy aims for, not just Aberdeenshire, but the whole of the North East of Scotland within NESBReC's remit. Section 5 of this Strategy provides the list of key performance indicators NESBReC will use to measure how the core outcomes of the Strategy have been achieved.
