How CLD works

Experienced CLD staff in Aberdeenshire use formal and informal learning methods to help deliver positive change for those living and working in our council area. Our service is targeted where it is most needed and a significant part of our work involves helping learners get accreditation/qualifications in recognition of their work with us, supporting them to progress in their learning journey and with their lives.

You will typically find us...

Working with adults and families

By supporting adults through improving skills and confidence in English as a second language; delivering ICT learning programmes to enhance employability and quality of life; family learning groups; promoting and encouraging personal development; and through improved reading, writing and numeracy in small groups or one to one learning.

Working to support and strengthen communities

By supporting volunteers to make contributions in their community but also to enrich their own lives; developing new groups; working with community groups so that they operate as effectively as possible; delivering training programmes for individuals and groups which lead to inclusive approaches in community settings; and assisting with advice and guidance on managing and delivering local services.

Working with young people

By supporting young people to overcome challenges by developing life skills; building youth representation through local forums and the Aberdeenshire Youth Council; delivering tailored learning programmes in school settings; offering accreditation through Youth Achievement Awards and other routes; and developing skills for employability for those young people who need that extra support to make their way in life.

The <u>Requirements for Community Learning and Development (Scotland)</u>
<u>Regulations 2013</u> place a requirement in statute by the Scottish Government for CLD to work with partners to produce an authority wide plan focusing on:

- Improving life chances for people of all ages through learning, personal development and active citizenship
- Building stronger, more resilient, supportive, influential and inclusive communities

Why recognise learner achievements?

Accredited awards recognise wider achievement and the development of knowledge and skills, which will help people to be successful in work and everyday life. Every award demonstrates achievement in learning that is personal to the individual. Motivation for that learning can include:

- Trying something new and challenging oneself
- Reducing social isolation through engagement with fellow learners
- Building confidence by increasing skills and abilities
- Obtaining recognised awards for future work and learning opportunities
- CV Building
- Supporting applications to work or further education
- Empowering individuals to be more independent and resourceful

For young people

CLD promotes lifelong learning opportunities through activities which are not only educational and rewarding, but are also fun to take part in. This is key for successful and continued engagement with young people. Through participation in accreditation our young people become familiar with peer assessment, social interaction, working as part of a team and many other positive developmental stages that are important for life and which will act as a foundation to enhance their personal journey of self-discovery.

Recognising, celebrating and rewarding achievement regardless of the level, is crucial for building self-esteem and confidence and encourages young people to 'go for it'. It also allows all our young people to demonstrate their skills and attributes to potential employers, or education providers, through achieving these recognised awards.

For Adults

No two adult learners have the same reasons for wanting or needing to learn something new. CLD staff support adult learners to build on their existing strengths and experiences and develop the skills they need to be more successful at work or in the community. The pace and level of learning is agreed with each learner, and learners have personalised support from tutors, fitting the learning around family and work commitments.

Adult learners may:

- want to develop their knowledge, skills and understanding needed for everyday life
- want to be more resourceful, independent and confident in areas of their life
- need their first steps to further education and training
- need to raise their chances when looking for work or promotion at work
- need to be able to support family learning at home and in school
- want to enjoy learning, on their own or with others, and appreciate formal recognition of that success
- have had negative experiences in school and now want to catch up with what they feel they missed

The awards available through the Adult Learning team are extremely flexible and inclusive. There are no entry requirements and learning can be undertaken individually or in a group, supported locally by experienced staff. All a learner needs to bring is enthusiasm, experience and commitment.

For many adult learners, working towards an accreditation is often their first experience of achieving a nationally recognised award. This boosts their confidence and also provides the learner with evidence of achievement on a nationally recognised and valued SQA framework, which employers and education establishments also understand and value.

Accreditation routes available through Aberdeenshire CLD Service

In our CLD staff group we have 28 trained and qualified SQA Assessors and 5 Internal Verifiers operating within the Aberdeenshire Council SVQ Registered Centre.

We also have staff trained and certificated in facilitation and moderation with Youth Scotland and the Pacific Institute. Altogether this ensures that we maintain rigour and quality in the programmes which we offer. It is also an investment in staff skills and qualifications.

In the CLD Service we work with the following awarding bodies to provide accreditation routes at different levels, for learners of all ages.

Awards Network

The Awards Network is a national forum of providers of youth work awards providing nonformal learning opportunities for young people in Scotland. Its members work together to raise awareness of the range and impact of youth work awards that accredit learning and achievements of young people aged 10 to 25. Its membership includes the largest youth organisations in Scotland along with a range of niche award providers.

The **Vision of the Awards Network** is that 'Youth Work Awards are widely valued and accepted as critical evidence of every young person's learning and achievement'. More information is available in *Amazing Things 4th Edition*. Produced by the Awards Network, *Amazing Things* highlights opportunities and potential of youth awards to support and recognise the achievements of young people. Contributions from Government, education and employers demonstrate growing recognition of the role and value of youth awards to develop life skills and learner journeys towards further learning and employment. The impact of youth awards is ably illustrated through stories and views from young people.

Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA)

Based in Scotland, the SQA works across the UK and internationally and is sponsored by the Scottish Government's Learning Directorate. The SQA's functions are set out in the Education (Scotland) Act 1996 as amended by the Scottish Qualifications Act 2002.

The organisation has two main roles: accreditation and awarding qualifications.

Accreditation:

- · accredits qualifications other than degrees
- approves, and quality assures awarding bodies that plan to enter people for these qualifications

Awarding

- devises and develops qualifications
- validates qualifications (makes sure they are well written and meet the needs of learners and tutors)
- reviews qualifications to ensure they are up to date
- arranges for, assists in, and carries out, the assessment of people taking SQA qualifications
- quality-assures education and training establishments which offer SQA qualifications
- issues certificates to candidates

Within these roles the SQA offer a range of services for businesses and training providers, ranging from course and centre approval through customised awards, to endorsement, credit rating and licensing services.

This award was developed by Newbattle Abbey College at the request of the Scottish Government and the SQA. CLD staff can support adult learners to work through the accreditation.



How Accreditation fits within the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF)

SCQF is a way of levelling Scottish qualifications. It covers achievements such as those from school, college, university, and many work-based qualifications. It does this by giving each qualification a level and number of credit points. The level of a qualification shows how difficult the learning is. The credit points show how much learning is involved in achieving that qualification. Each credit point represents an average of 10 hours of learning. All Scottish universities and colleges use SCQF levels and credit points to describe their courses. A wide range of other learning is also recognised using SCQF levels and credits. SCQF also illustrates the relationships between Scottish qualifications and those in the rest of the UK, Europe and beyond, which can clarify international progression routes and credit transfer. Much of the Accreditation on offer within CLD has an equivalent SCQF rating.

SCQF can help:

- Learners see a progression route in their learning
- Learners understand qualifications they are not familiar with
- Employers understand different types of qualifications and help with the development of employee skills
- Colleges and universities identify the level that has been studied in a subject and make it easier to transfer credit points between different learning programmes
- Provide recognition for other areas of learning that may contribute to personal development and future goals.

Summary of the Accredited Awards available to Young People

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

This well-respected award is a recognition of a young person's successful journey of self-discovery and development, renowned by employers and universities alike for the qualities harnessed. Its balanced programme develops the whole person (mind, body and soul) in an environment of social interaction and team working.

Dynamic Youth Awards

The Awards follow a Plan-Do-Review process which enables young people to more effectively recognise and articulate their learning and achievements within different contexts. This increases their self-esteem, improves motivation and keeps young people engaged with learning. Through self and peer assessment young people develop skills for learning, life and work. The Awards fully support the aims, values, purpose and implementation of Curriculum for Excellence.

John Muir Awards

This inclusive and non-competitive scheme helps participants appreciate and value nature, urban greenspace and wild landscapes. It encourages awareness, understanding and responsibility for wild places. It promotes personal development and healthy living through outdoor experiences. It encourages an environmental agenda – for individuals and organisations.

Hi5

Youth Scotland's Hi5 awards provide a framework to support quality work with young people. They offer recognition and accreditation for young peoples' achievements. They are easy to use and incorporate into existing or planned activities and can be delivered in a range of settings including youth and community projects, schools and colleges.

Saltire Awards

Through their volunteering young people can gain new skills, meet new people, give something back to the community and have fun in the process. As part of the programme young people get a certificate, which along with the support and training given, means they get something that looks great on their CV and job and UCAS applications and is endorsed by employers and universities.

Prince's Trust Achieve

Achieve can help young people boost their confidence, learn new skills and work with their friends on a group project. The programme is completely flexible and may include:

- Delivering a community project and making a real difference in the local area
- Learning all sorts of new skills to help with meeting new people and building confidence
- Taking on a business challenge to put their entrepreneurial skills to the test
- Improving their knowledge and ability to look after themselves and live a healthy life
- Top tips to help them write the perfect CV and get ahead in their career

Participative Democracy Certificate

This award is based on decision-making in groups. It gives participants the opportunity to acknowledge and develop communication, decision making and negotiation in the context of democratic engagement. It is worth two credits at SCQF Level 5 (equivalent to a National 5 or SVQ 2). Each credit is based on 10 hours of learning activity.

Youth Achievement Awards

The Youth Achievement Awards are individual learning awards that provide a framework to support quality work with young people. They offer formal recognition and accreditation for young peoples' achievements. They are easy to use and incorporate into existing or planned activities and can be delivered in a range of settings including youth and community projects, schools and colleges.

Young Scot Award

Inspiring young people are nominated for the Young Scot Award. The Young Scot Awards is Scotland's biggest celebration of young people and shines the spotlight on the outstanding contribution of young people aged 11-26, who have made a real difference to the lives of others.

PX2® and Mindbuzz

In a group setting PX2® and Mindbuzz teach the art and science of goal setting combined with a thorough understanding of just how we think, allowing young people to build self-confidence, self-esteem and a strong self-belief. The programme has 12 units incorporating video clips, group activities, discussion and personal reflection.

SQA Employability (levels 3 and 4)

Employability units develop skills needed to find and be effective in any job. It complements all 5 SQA Core Skills Units and learners often decide to work on both simultaneously.

SQA English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Nationals

CLD offers 9 SQA units, from Literacies to ESOL in Everyday Life and ESOL in Context, these can build up to ESOL National 2 or 3. They take a learner whose first language may not use Roman script from complete beginner to level 3. This level is recognised as the minimum needed for independent everyday communication at work, in family and community life. This level is seen as a prerequisite for many SQA units that may be delivered in Further Education. Learners develop all four skills, listening, speaking, reading and writing.

SQA Mental Health and Wellbeing Awards

Mental Health and Wellbeing award consists of 3 mandatory units which can be delivered and assessed in many different contexts. These very flexible units, counting as 18 credit points. They investigate details of mental health issues and influences as well as coping strategies. Most of the units are achieved through discussions, self-study and creative production.

SQA Volunteering Skills Awards

Volunteering Skills awards formally recognise skills developed through volunteering, which may prepare learners for future responsibilities, such as studying and employment. Units have elements of problem solving, working with others and self-reflection which may be of interest to any age learner/volunteer.

Adult Achievements Awards (AAA)

These awards offer valuable reflection time for learners and formal recognition of learning recently undertaken in any context, including in work and volunteering in the community, as well as personal and family learning. Adults are supported to investigate ways we all learn as adults, to recognise their own strengths and learning skills and are supported to build on these skills, setting clear goals and practicable action plans.

STEPS Personal Development Programme

Created by The Pacific Institute ® and supports learners to find new ways to realise their potential. The 13-unit course runs over a 2-3 month period in small group learning sessions delivered by trained facilitators. It can be particularly effective for those facing transitions and has been used successfully to support learners with a variety of life goals.
